

#### From the Collections Of Barend Wissink

N.W.M.P. to R.C.M.P. 1873 to 1920 and Beyond. By Barend Wissink

With our Spring Show coming up a small intro

to the R.C.M.P. seems to be in order.



It starts with our first Prime Minster Sir John A. McDonald a Liberal-Conservative responsible for

bringing Rupert's Land and the N.W.T. into Canada. He saw a need for a police force and started the ball rolling



by 1870. Three years later the N.W.M.P. was created. The long trek Westward started July 8<sup>th</sup> 1874, in response to The Cypress Hills Massacre of 1873. Our second Prime Minster Alexander MacKenzie (Liberal) was now in charge,



(McDonald resigned due to a scandal) the massacre was blamed on the American whisky traders of Fort Benton coming up to Fort Whoop Up and selling Firewater to the natives.

Jarvis's Route

Starting up with 150 men who trained at Dufferin Manitoba, the ranks swelled to 275 members by the time of the Westward Trek. Permanent posts were set up at Fort McLeod, Fort Edmonton and Fort Pelly in present day Saskatchewan next to the Manitoba border. The next year Fort Calgary and Fort Walsh were established.

Starting out with 150 men in 1873 to 275 by 1874, by 1885 the force had grown to 1000, but in 1896 its future was threatened by the newly elected Prime minister Sir Wilfred Laurier (Liberal) who had plans to reduce the force and eventually disband them. Hallelujah saved by the Klondyke Gold Rush of 1897.

R.N.W.M.P. joined with Dominion Police to form the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in 1920, with the headquarters moving from Regina to Ottawa.



The R.C.M.P. were 25 member strong when the gold rush started in 1897 and swelled to 250 members by 1899 in the Yukon. As we are going to see at our Spring Show the amount of R.C.M.P. material that is really out there.





#### Pigeon Post, follow-up

In the "Bulletin" Volume 108, Number 10, I placed a note requesting information on two Japanese Pigeon Post items. Thanks to the efforts of our readers corresponding together I was sent the following information originating from the International Society for Japanese Philately. "These appear to be horse racing results, which would have been sent by the fastest way back to the newspaper office for the evening edition. I see what look like Japanese-style horse names, numbers, time, money amounts indicative of payouts, some other things I'm not sure of – the red markings say "6 point", which I would guess direct type setters".

The fine print indicates these as Osaka Mainichi Newspaper stationary.





I personally find it very amusing that human priorities remain the same over time. The most important and time sensitive news in 1936 and today is the sports news particularly the spread and payout. Japanese newspapers were still using pigeon post in 1964 at the Tokyo Olympics. The last newspaper pigeon loft was closed in 31 Aug 1966.


# ESC Contributes to Philatelic Knowledge Richard Barnes

I received a phone call from a lady here in Edmonton as a representative of the Edmonton Stamp Club asking me what to do with a stamp booklet that belonged to her grandfather. She wanted to find out about this booklet, history, value etc. She sent me some scans. From the very first scans [fig .1-.2], I realized that this was something special.





I did not have the knowledge to properly evaluate this philatelic item, but I realized there was a worthwhile monetary value involved [fig .3-.4].

I put her in contact with Ernie Carlson, a knowledgeable philatelist in Canadian stamps and postal history and a fellow member of the Edmonton Stamp Club. The owner and I also had a discussion on possible options on what to do with this item. In response to her questions I stated my jaundiced opinion about making donations to museums/archives on such items. My observations are that it is better to put a unique or interesting item into auction than in an archive where it will put in a drawer to be?? At the very least this booklet will be seen and appreciated by the public during periodically auctions, catalogue notes, and possible notes in publications. Ernie met with the owner. After examining this booklet, he confirmed the purpose and use of the Postage on Newspapers book (record of receipt of payment by Canada Post) and that there was financial value to this item. He presented options to the owner for its disposal. Next page

The following detailed description of this rare item is quoted from the Longley Auctions Sale #25, January 18<sup>th</sup>, 2020, Lot 200;

#### Canada Jubilee Postal History

200 ■ 1899-1900 Newspaper receipt book for the Montreal Herald, 42 pages with various stamps including a 15¢ Large Queen, \$3 Jubilee pair, Small Queens, Widow Weeds, Leaf and Numeral issues. The booklet front is titled "Postage for Newspapers" and is form "rev, 29 P.M. - 200-29-7-97." indicating only 200 were printed in 1897. The name of publication is filled in as "Herald 2/9/99". The first example is dated Feb 2, 1899 and the last is April 18, 1900.

The 100 page book has 42 pages used with stamps. The breakdown of stamps is 15¢ Large Queen (9), 20¢ Widow Weed (61), 50¢ Widow Weed (56), 3¢ Jubilee (1), \$2 Jubilee (8), \$3 Jubilee (5), 1/2¢ Numeral (1), 2¢ (25), 5¢(1), 6¢(3), 8¢(3), 10¢(4), 2¢ on 3¢ Leaf (1), and 2¢ Map (1). One page is for 142.5 lbs and the half pound is paid with a 1/2¢ Numeral. This is incorrect as the rate was 1¢ per pound or fraction thereof.

This booklet demonstrates the main use of the Widow Weeds and high value Jubilees. Legitimate, commercial uses of such are rare. This process of payment stopped in July 1, 1902.

The other booklet, from the Toronto Globe booklet is different with the name of "William White DPMG".

Collectors may recall the Toronto Globe newspaper receipt book which is described in detail on the PHSC website at https://www.postalhistorycanada.net/php/Library/Research/Globe/int\_npb.php

This is a second-chance of a lifetime to, acquire a true Canadian rarity. Scans shown are just a sample of the book. There are 42 pages with stamps

Prices realized for Longley's 18<sup>th</sup> Jan 2020 auction is up on his website. The booklet, lot 200, hammered for \$8000.00 plus 15% buyer's premium plus GST for a total of \$9660.00. That was against an estimate of \$5000.00. Astounding.

I'm glad now that Diane Carl was smart enough not to accept my offer and take Robin Harris's advice and send the booklet to auction. I'm pondering now on whether or not I should contact Diane to congratulate her or just let things pass.

The Edmonton Stamp Club provides many services to members and the public. The ESC'S Consignment Sales Service has many functions. In this case it was the contact point to identify a rare philatelic item, save it from the trash or a musty drawer. The result is that this item has been presented to the philatelic community while providing the owner with a bit of cash. The BIG plus for Ernie was he got to see and hold a rare if not unique Canadian Postal item. Only two Postage on Newspapers booklets are known to exist, one from Toronto and now this Montreal booklet rescued from a drawer in Edmonton and the Edmonton Stamp Club were part of the rescue.

# Hello I need some assistance and i am hoping somebody in your organization can help. I am sending a couple of German stamps for certification and they require a Scotts number and book valuation on the submitted forms. The stamps are the Tunis palm tree and the U boat issues. Both are mint and in excellent condition. Can anybody help with this. Thank you D.A.

The amusing part was the lack of knowledge that D.A. showed and jumped straight to seeking certification. My reply to the request is described below. No scans were provided by D.A to help in identification. So, I guessed. Fred's reply:

#### Hello Dwayne;

The U-boat issues have a Scott #B218 to B229, they are valued at \$5.50 (mint hinged), or \$18.00 (mint never hinged). These prices are for the whole set of 12 stamps.

During WW2 the German army in the North Africa theater used field post parcel stamps as described in the Michael catalog. This stamp is not mentioned in the Scott standard catalog.



\* = mint, \*\* = mint never hinged, the third price is a certified used stamp. Scan from the German catalogue, I think the prices quoted are in euros (2005)

To be sure send a scan of the stamps at 600 dpi. Don't request certification of the U-boat stamps, cost of certification is far greater than the value of the stamps.
