

TWO BRIDGES FOR THE PRICE OF ONE by Barend Wissink

STAUFFER BRIDGE DRUMHELLER #17 IN THE SERIES

I had only one post card of this bridge for quite awhile, not only did I not see any others

but this card turned up a half a dozen times, must be the most common of all the Drumheller bridge cards. This post card is also the only one that is postally used, six other post cards have found their way into my hands and they are all unused.



The bridge itself is

a three span Warren Open Truss across the Red Deer River on Hwy 56 that joined the village of North Drumheller to the town of Drumheller, named after Liberal Speaker of the House Joseph Stauffer (1874-1917) Alberta Legislature from 1909 until 1917 when



he was shot and killed at Vimy Ridge on April 10th 1917. His name lives on with the Village of Stauffer. It was hard to tell exactly where this bridge was at first, matter of fact the first post card I couldn't tell if it was a traffic bridge or a rail road

bridge. This second post card makes it all clear, it is a traffic bridge. Looking from the North bank to the East you can see the smoke stack of the Canadian Utilities Ltd. which was east of the present bridge with the honking big T Rex next to it.

The Stauffer Bridge was built in 1916 and demolished in 1959.

The view from the east looking west from the top of the valley rim down to the bridge

Which leads us to the replacement

TOPICAL COCONUTS

In this month's exciting episode of *Astronomers On Stamps*, we have the historical equivalent of what I would consider the (eventually) irresistible force of science (Heliocentrism, the idea of the Earth going around the Sun) meeting what at that time was an immovable object (the Roman Catholic Church), namely the life and times of **Galileo Galilei**. We know who won that battle, but we also know who eventually won the war in the end.






Many of the astronomers that have been the subjects of my astronomy-themed columns are unknown to a lot of people, and there is little historical information about them. Galileo, on the other hand, brings a wealth of material; one might



even call it an embarrassment of riches, as far as historical information goes. For the sake of brevity, and the opportunity to showcase more stamps in lieu of my long-winded blathering's,

I will skim over some of his life and encourage the reader to pursue their own reading concerning this iconic scientific figure.








Galileo di Vincenzo Bonaulti de Galilei, commonly known to us simply as Galileo, was born on February 15, 1564 in Pisa, in what was then the Duchy of Florence, Italy, and died on January 8, 1642 at the age of 77 in Arcetri, in what was then the

Grand Duchy of Tuscany, Italy. Regarded as a polymath, besides being an astronomer, physicist and engineer, Galileo has been referred to, by various people at various times, as the father of visual astronomy, modern physics, the scientific method, and even of modern science. Wow, those are some seriously heavyweight credentials!!!


One of six children born to Vincenzo Galilei, a musician, and Giulia (née Ammannati), Galileo became was a talented accomplished lutenist and all well rounded musician himself. His father also passed on his demanding requirement for experimentation, testing and taking nothing for granted in all his fields of study. A prime example was his experiment that saw him drop spheres of different weights of the Tower of Pisa and determining that they fell at the same rate, a conclusion that flew in the face of Aristotelian thought.








At first, Galileo's father wanted to his son to follow in the family business, but soon enough it was obvious that Galileo was meant for higher learning. Originally enrolled at the University of Pisa in 1583 to study medicine, soon became sidetracked by mathematics and physics. It was here at Pisa that Galileo was exposed to the Aristotelian view of the world, which was the only scientific view approved by the Roman Catholic Church.








During his time at Pisa, he heard about a remarkable new invention, the telescope. He obtained one, made improvements on it, started a program of observation and was, as they say "off to the races". Finding craters and mountains on the Moon, phases in the orbits of Venus and four moons around Jupiter (eventually named the Galilean moons) led him to conclude that the Heliocentric view of the cosmos was right, and Aristotle was wrong. That set the stage for a conflict with the Roman Catholic Church that saw him accused and eventually convicted by the Inquisition in 1633, which found him "vehemently suspect of heresy". He was forced to recant his beliefs and spent the rest of his life under house arrest for his pains. To its credit the Catholic Church admitted its error in 1993 and Pope John Paul II issued an official apology. It only took 359 years.





I will leave with one last Galilean tidbit: At some later stage of his life, after his trial and humiliation, Galileo supposedly uttered "And yet it moves" or "Albeit it does move" (in Italian: "E pur si muove: or "Eppur si muove si"), to mean that the Earth indeed does revolve



around the Sun, despite what the powers that be may wish. This phrase has become, in some circles, representative of the eternal fight against ignorance and intellectual oppression.

Valle Bormida Stamps

I was asked if I knew what this stamp was [Fig.1]. I did not remember seeing this stamp before. I could not find anything in the Italian sections of any of my catalogues. My Sassne catalogue only lists the government postal services stamps. Luckily, I quickly found this stamp on a dealer's site. It is a stamp issued by an Italian Anti-Fascist group based in the Bormida Valley, Italy in 1945 [Fig.2].



The date on the stamp is 1943-1945. In September 1943 most of the multiplicity of Italian anti-fascist groups came together to form the National Liberation Committee, or CLN to oppose the German/Italian Fascists Occupation of Italy resulting from the surrender of the Royal Italian Government to the Allies. The CLN's immediate reason to be was to maximize the Italian Resistance to the occupation. When looking at the Italian Resistance stamps remember these stamps were produced in different regions, different cities and groups who had very divergent political philosophies. My observations while researching the Valle Bormida stamps is that there are many different sets of CLN resistance stamps [Fig.3-4-5-6-7].

If my count is correct there are 20 different issuers of Italian Resistance stamps. Most of the CLN overprinted stamps are on Italian Socialist Republic stamps. Old left-over Post Italiane stamps found in the Post Offices were overprinted.

When looking for Italian Resistance Stamps the Bormida Valley locally printed stamps are the most often found stamps. This set of eleven stamps



[Fig.8] was produced in larger numbers [few thousands] than the overprinted stamps [a couple of hundred or less]. In addition, the resistance in the Bormida Valley issued a small run of different

The CLN Prefect of Alessandria issued a note on 2 May 1945, authorizing the Bormida Valley stamps to be valid for postage. They were used for postage on local mail. Numerous philatelic covers were made. The Allied Military Government [GMA] on 5 May 1945 decreed that CLN stamps could not be used as postage. No other CLN stamps except the Bormida Valley stamps were used on to pay local postal charges. The use of Bormida Valley stamps ceased on 20 May 1945. Next page

These stamps demand a good price in the dealer catalogues. All the CLN stamps were produced in very small numbers, some as few as 10 known stamps. Mint Italian stamps that were used by the Italian Resistance to be overprinted were numerous then and still are. Circumstances necessitated the 11 stamps of the statue Bormida Valley set were likely printed in small production runs creating differences between runs. This may explain the cause of the variety of color intensity/shade and papers between stamps of the same design and value. Another possibility is forgeries. All these Italian Resistance stamps and CLN stamps are forged.
