



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

## WHEN COAL WAS KING BEFORE BEING DEMOTED TO A CARBON TAXABLE POLLUTANT by Barend Wissink

The coal mines of Alberta had its start in the development of the West and the Southern Alberta in the 1870's around what is now known as the city of Lethbridge. To start this





series of articles we have to go back in history and introduce father and son, the Galts. Sir Alexander Galt and Elliot Torrence Galt. Sir Alexander was one of the Fathers of Confederation and named Canada's first Finance Minster in 1867. As Finance Minster he started the Geological Survey to explore the West.

Sir John A. McDonald appointed Sir Alexander Galt as High Commissioner to Britain with a mandate to develop the North West Territories in 1880.

Elliot his son had seen the outcroppings of coal in the 1870's around what was Coal Banks on the Belly River (now the Oldman River), and convinceed Sir Alexander to initiate development. With this Sir Alexander started the North Western Coal & and Navigation Co. (NWC&CO) in 1881. In 1882

the Galt's opened the first of its drift mines. The lower post card is from 1905 and it is a




undivided back post card with space on the front for a message. Also along the top of the back of the card is printed "Entered according to Act of the government of Canada in the year 1904 by Knowles & Co. London Ontario at the Department of Agriculture Ottawa."

The next two cards are also copies of the same photo. The top one is the original photo by Arthur Rafton- Canning published by The British and Colonial Photographic Co.(1907-1913) at 6th St. S. Lethbridge .

The lower is a colourized version by Rumsey & Co. of Queen St. Toronto.

There were 9 Galt drift mine entrances in all, opened between 1882 and 1889. Galt 1 & 2 was closed by 1893.





The coal is found in two layers that go down to 445 ft. in 1882 the mine produced 4000 tons of coal & more than doubled the following year. By 1889 the Galt mine produced more than 80,000 tons. Three villages sprung up near the mine shafts, the first Stafford Village by shaft #3 which had a post office (1910-1918). Hopkinsville sprung up around shaft #5 with no post office and around shaft #6 there was Hardieville with a post office (1910-1965) all three absorbed into Lethbridge Ad from Claresholm Advisor Dec 9, 1914







The next post card is a promotion card for the City of Lethbridge in 1906, all-though it was mailed from Lethbridge in 1907. It shows the City coat of Arms with a circle trisection. The top section shows a steam locomotive for the CPR a stook of grain for farming and the last section a miners pick for the coal mines. On the ribbon underneath reads in Latin, AD OCCASIONIS JANUAN when translated to English Gateway to Opportunity. The bottom half shows the Galt Collieries.

This card commemorates the dates 1890 when Lethbridge became a town and 1906 when it became a city.

The top card is Published for Robert Sage who printed "The Critic" at 112 5<sup>th</sup> St. S. in Lethbridge.

The lower card is a copy of the upper card only the smoke is different, added later.

This card was published for Robertson's Bookstore. This bookstore was located at 413 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. S in Lethbridge. Both cards were made by Warwick Bros. & Rutter Ltd. printers Toronto

#### **Uncommon Common Stamps**

I received in a lot of unknown stamps two Romanian stamps (Fig 1-2) from a fellow collector asking me to identify them. I was surprised because they look to be common stamps found frequently in mixtures. A quick look in the catalogue and I found the stamps in Scott RA13-15. What's this? A note after RA15, "Other denominations were used fiscally". These are "other" denominations.





On the web there was a reference to the Michel catalogue, but my new catalogues no longer have anything more than a note on these stamps. It is better to be lucky than good. I was lucky, and I found this catalogue page on the web (Fig 3). There is a total of 7 different stamps in this set ranging from 10 B to 50 L. This set of stamps was in use for probably 10 years requiring numerous printings which in turn resulted in color varieties and perf varieties.

It appears that the original purpose for printing these stamps was to generate money for soldiers' families. RA13 – RA15 were intended as a tax on mail. The remaining stamps were intended for a tax on railway parcels and as a general fiscal tax stamp as needed.

The literature become rather blurred how these stamps were used. There is references to RA13 – RA15 being tolerated for postage, as well as the other stamps. The confusion between sources may be a result of when RA15, was issued in 1928 the face value 25 B of this stamp coincided with an increased first-class mail rate to 25 B.



Another contradiction between various sources is the rarity of the fiscal stamps not listed in Scott. Perhaps the availability of these fiscal stamps maybe the result of people like me ignoring them thinking we already know that we have all the stamps of the set. The 1983 publication "Romania Revenues" by Andrew Hall places very little difference in catalogue value of these stamps between the 5 B and the remaining stamps of this set except for the high value 50 L stamp.

Does any member have covers/wrappers showing the use of these stamps? Any clarification on the use of these stamps would be appreciated.

#### THE PANAMA CANAL STORY Part 5

## Continued from December 2018 Ray Ireson



2: 2 The Panama Rail Road

The Gold Rush highlighted the need for better transportation means across the Isthmus. In 1848, William H. Aspinwall, senior partner in Howland & Aspinwall, wealthy New York merchants, obtained a railroad concession from New Granada.

Wm. H. Aspinwall, Henry Chauncey [banker] and John L. Stephens [lawyer] founded the Panama Rail Road Company in New York in 1849

J.L. STEPHENS was the Company's first President: he was also a noted archeologist. He died in 1852, aged 46, from fever contracted at the construction site.

Chagres was a cesspool, so the Company built a new township to serve as their Atlantic terminus. Work on the railroad began in 1850.



The DEATH TOLL from fevers was estimated to be 10,000! Burial in swampy jungle was impossible.



To dispose of the cadavers the Company pickled them in barrels of brine and sold them to medical schools all over the world. The proceeds maintained their hospital on the Isthmus.

After lengthy delays and huge cost over-runs, the line was inaugurated on January 28, 1855. The  $47\frac{1}{2}$  mile track was the world's first transcontinental railroad. It would play a vital rôle in the Canal's construction years later.



Special cancel used one day only - Jan. 28, 1955 - to mark the 100th Anniversary of the Railroad.

Because of the railroad, mail ships eventually abandoned Chagres in favour of ASPINWALL — the new terminus township built by Panama Railroad personnel on the island of Manzanillo in Navy Bay and officially inaugurated on February 2, 1852.

The Americans had named the township after the railroad's promotor, but the local inhabitants wanted it called COLON (the Spanish equivalent of COLUMBUS). The two names co-existed until 1863, when the Colombian Congress declared the official name to be COLON. After that, all mail addressed to ASPINWALL was not delivered.






Early 1850's cover addressed to ASPINWALL

PANAMA: A CROSSROAD 2:3 Shipping Line Services

The growing importance of Colón and Panama attracted increased activity from existing and new shipping lines. The Isthmus entered a new era of prosperity.

THE ROYAL MAIL STEAM PACKET COMPANY was founded in 1839, and on November 29, 1841 it was awarded the mail contract between Great Britain and her Caribbean colonies. Service began on January 1, 1842 with the sailing of the sidewheeler "Thames" (featured on the 50c value of this souvenir sheet). Jamaica was the first terminus: the line was extended to Chagres in 1846 and to Aspinwall in 1852.



The other three sailing ships shown in this souvenir sheet were used in the British Admiralty and Post Office packet services to the Caribbean.
