

Pairing Perforations, Part 1: Jean-Paul Riopelle

Since Ashton Potter introduced the use of "bi-gauge" perforations on the vertical sides of the Masterpieces of Canadian Art #1 - *The Young Reader* stamp (Unitrade 1203, p. 266) on 20 January 1988, many other stamps have been produced with bi-gauge perforations on either the vertical or horizontal edges.

Here is a quick and simple way of determining the possible uses of bi-gauge perforations on any stamp. As shown in Figure 1, take two identical stamps and rotate one 180 degrees, then pair the rotated stamp's perforations against the upright stamp's perforations.

Look carefully at the paired perforations between stamp A and stamp B1 in Figure 1. The perforations match perfectly, implying that the perforations are uniformly spaced and equally sized along the entire horizontal edge.

Now look carefully at the paired perforations between stamp A and B2 in Figure 1. Obviously, the paired perforations do not match along the entire vertical side.

This implies that the perforations along the vertical side are multi-gauged. By sliding stamp B2 vertically, an exact match of the paired perforations can be made at the halfway point, as shown in Figure 2, indicating the edge is bi-gauge perforated.

By scanning a centimeter ruler simultaneously with the image of the stamp the actual perforation gauges can be accurately counted against this scale and measured as shown in Figure 3.

By my research this Jean-Paul Riopelle suite of six stamps are all bi-gauge perforated as:

12.7 X (13.0 [upper half] and 13.3 [lower half])

not 12.5 X 13.3 as reported in the Unitrade catalogue (page 392).

What do you think?

The accuracy of any research is dependent on its reproducibility. Can somebody please either duplicate my research, or measure the perforations by some other means, and either confirm or reject my hypothesis that these stamps are in fact bi-gauge perforated vertically. Our long-suffering editor and I would both welcome your informed report.



The four of us had a lively discussion. We talked about how borders have shifted and the names of countries have changed, and how these changs are reflected in stamps. Bob explained a bit about postal history collecting. Another topic concerned what to do on the next day, Thursday, 7 March. On that day, 9th-grade students would be visiting Paul Kane High School, since they were moving into high school and exploring potential schools. At this open-house event, the various student clubs would have tables explaining their activities. So Ryan and Elsa made suggestions about what to feature at the table.

Success - Challenges - Future

I came home this evening after attending, in my opinion, the most successful Edmonton Stamp Club Spring Stamp Show that I can remember. The ESC should accept congratulations for hosting another excellent event. Remember to praise the club members for their work and success: Ed Dykstra our VP and show coordinator, his show committee members, and our fellow club members who did the work to set up, host, and operate this show, and take down the show upon completion.

For almost two years now the ESC in conjunction with the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada (RPSC) were looking towards the ESC hosting a three day ROYAL Stamp Show in June 2025 instead of our usual spring show. This has required a lot of work, discussion, and some controversy for the ESC board. The members of the ESC board, as volunteers, have only so much time and energy; and some

members' concerns and suggestions have not been acted upon. This project has been resolved for the ESC. We will not be hosting a Royal show in 2025. Our board has been told by the RPSC that Montreal will host the 2025 Royal show. Now we can move on to acting on ESC members' suggestions for change and improvement. The ESC has a solid financial base to move forward in the immediate future.

To be successful, the ESC must have member participation and leadership going forward in the coming years. We have our elections coming up in June. There are only four ESC regular meeting between now and June when the club elections take place. In addition to the elections of regular ESC board members this year, we must fill the positions of <u>president</u>, <u>treasurer</u>, and <u>secretary</u>. These are critical positions to maintain the basic functions of the club.

Please think about participating in the operations of our club. If you think the Edmonton Stamp Club is a worthwhile activity, please consider becoming a board member. Talk with other members of the club and discuss participating on the board. If you have previous experience that would assist the club in financial matters or administration, talk to your fellow club members and/or current board members. PLEASE think about taking on an executive position. Warren Stein is the board member with the information about standing for election.

In addition to working to improve existing functions and programs, I expect the ESC will be looking at the suggestions and recommendations that were submitted to the board during the survey provided to members in the past. Part of the implementation of changes to our operations will be the introduction early in the new club year of committees to assist the board to implement procedures. Committee members will only have to be ESC members. I know that the ESC is looking to make more practical use of the computer and the Web. We need members who are knowledgeable in using computers for more than sending emails to identify themselves and hopefully letting their name stand for election or notify the club of their willingness to assist on a committee. I regret that I am just a duffer with a computer.

I will be letting my name stand in the coming election.

Robert Schutte was born in Amsterdam in 1937. History tells us that he spent his early years in an occupied country, followed by the harsh postwar years. He dedicated his time and energy to his interest in chemistry until he earned his doctorate. Along the way he met, courted, and married his lifelong soulmate, Margot. The opportunity to continue his studies at the University of Alberta led the two to emigrate in 1963, arriving in the depth of winter in Edmonton three days before New Year's Eve. They had one another and persevered.

Upon completion of his second doctorate, Rob became an early employee (#64) at a new venture in northern Alberta. Two years of research led to the first Syncrude pilot plant opening, and he became Director of Research, and then Director of Mining Technical at the time of his retirement. The family had grown to five by then, and although Margot remembers the strain of living hours away from him for days and weeks at a time, she was able to enjoy retirement with him for almost thirty years.

Rob and Margot were now able to travel. China was one destination, and Rob began to take Chinese language lessons. An interest in and a dedication to Tai Chi led to his Master Teacher

designation. They tried living in Victoria, but returned to Edmonton where Rob spent his energy on his garden and his stamp collection (Netherlands, Art on stamps, Ships on stamps, Maps on stamps, and more).

A firm believer in the adage "many hands make light work," Rob assumed many roles in the ESC executive, including membership director and president, until health concerns and the Covid lockdowns eliminated that opportunity to participate.

Rob was a true gentleman, with an interest in others and a profound belief that people would thrive better with cooperation than with competition. He assisted where he could and was generous with his those he encountered. Those lucky enough to have spent time with him will miss him and, for all the others, try to find someone whose kind, compassionate, intelligent company makes you feel better for having been with them. Rob was like that.

He passed away on 21 February 2024.
